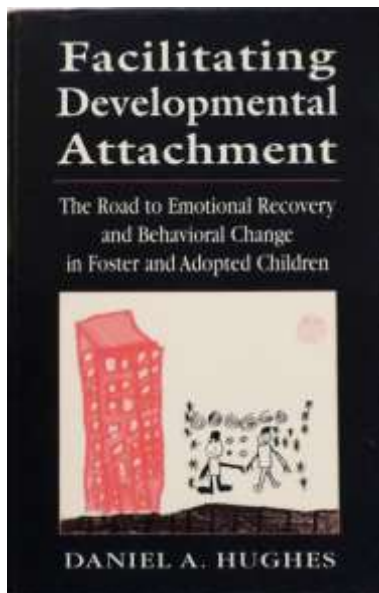




Facilitating Developmental Attachment by Daniel A. Hughes
